Uniting the world for 60 years

2022 was a special year in many aspects.

The world was gradually adapting to and moving on from the global covid-19 pandemic and we finally thought that things would stabilise and improve.

Then along came February 24. With Russia's invasion of Ukraine, the world yet again faced a war on European territory. The consequences have been great. Energy and food prices have increased everywhere, and the global outlook is looking more grim than in a long time.

In October 2022, the UWC movement turned 60 years old. The movement started with the foundation of UWC Atlantic (originally called Atlantic College) at the height of the Cold War in 1962. It was founded by the educational pioneer Kurt Hahn who believed in the power of education as a route to peace.

In a 1958 speech, Kurt Hahn said:

"There are three ways of trying to capture the young; one is to preach at them — I'm afraid that is a hook without a worm; the second is to coerce them... and to tell them 'You must volunteer'... the third is an appeal which never fails, 'You are needed'."

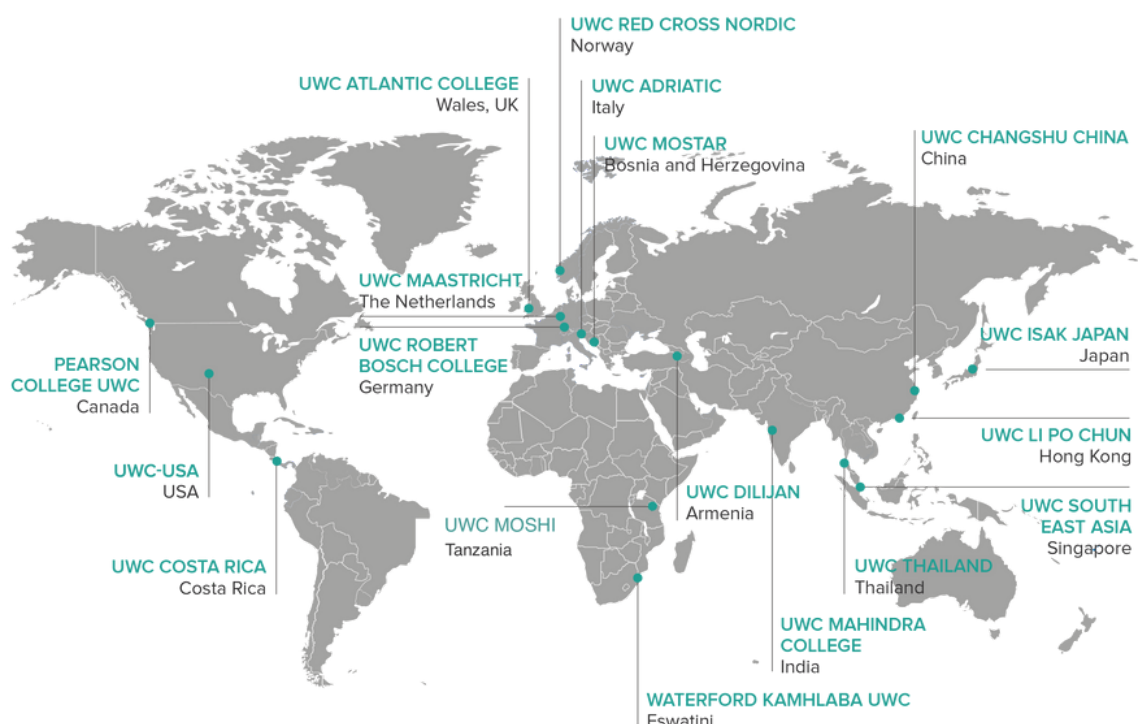
The first UWC school was built on the idea that if young people from different backgrounds were educated together, they could build an understanding which could prevent future conflicts.

In 1968, the growing movement was renamed United World Colleges. It is now a thriving global community, which includes 18 schools and colleges across four continents, hundreds of short courses, more than 4,000 volunteers, educators, partners, donors, students, staff, and almost 60,000 alumni.

60 years after the foundation of UWC, I'd wish the world was at a better place and that there was less need for such a movement. But as last year's events clearly shows – UWC might be more relevant than ever.

60 years after our foundation, UWC still makes education a force to unite people, nations and cultures for peace and a sustainable future.

About UWC Norway

Founded in 1962, United World Colleges (UWC) offers a challenging and transformative educational experience to a diverse cross section of students, inspiring them to create a more peaceful and sustainable future. There are currently 18 colleges around the world, out of which one is in Norway: UWC Red Cross Nordic is located in Fjaler in the county Vestland.

UWC Norway is one of over 160 UWC National Committees, which make up a network of over 3 000 volunteers. The National Committees promote UWC, select students and provide a community for UWC alumni. UWC Norway is a member organisation consisting of all former and current UWC students and teachers from Norway, and is run by volunteers.

UWC Norway cooperates with the Norwegian Directorate for Higher Education and Skills (HK-dir). HK-dir manages the Norwegian government's financial contribution to UWC Norway, and is a directorate reporting to the Norwegian Ministry of Education and Research.

The Norwegian National Committee consists of 25 UWC alumni, parents of students/alumni and former UWC teachers who volunteer to manage and develop the UWC movement.

The National Committee is responsible for the nomination and follow-up of students, managing finances, organising events, organising marketing and communications, fundraising and representing Norway in the international UWC movement.

UWC Norway has an office in Oslo, where a Director of Administration is employed full time. In addition, volunteer regional representatives are located in Bergen, Bodø, Trondheim and Tromsø. They are responsible for hosting local events for UWC students and alumni, as well as for assisting in marketing of the UWC schools through hosting information meetings.

Reflections on being a UWC student

UWC Norway asked some of our students if they could share some of their experiences. These are their stories:



From Japan

Marcus Solheim - UWC ISAK 2022-2024

This is the first year the Norwegian National Committee has accepted students to UWC ISAK Japan. Wanting to ensure that any future Scandinavians will feel as welcome as we have so far, this is why we feel like we have a responsibility of creating a positive Scandinavian community at this newly opened UWC.

Although UWC can be tough academically, the Japanese scenery and culture makes up for it. If you are interested in skiing, anime, cars, or anything else, I assure you that you will find it here in Japan. There is a club or culture for almost anything here, making Japan easy for anyone to adapt. The school is built up on mutual respect, which teaches you how to live with others in harmony.

Living on campus means that how often you experience the beauty of Japan will be up to you. This is why I personally say that UWC ISAK Japan is what you make it. How you choose to spend your time here may vary much depending on what type of person you are. The school does offer a few buses every week which can take you to nearby supermarkets or events. UWC ISAK Japan like many other UWC's is quite remote. Japan makes up for this though, with great public transport. Giving students the opportunity to take a bullet train from the local station to Tokyo in just over an hour!

Japan has strict laws compared to Norway and builds on trust. Which, in return, gives you a very safe and friendly environment to adapt, but may be a little different from what many are used to.

UWC ISAK Japan is for anyone with a strong aspiration and vigorous interest in expanding their cultural knowledge. Japan along with UWC ISAK Japan has opened numerous opportunities for me to do fashion, videography and so much more. Although stressful and hard, it is one of the most fulfilling experiences I have ever had. I hope to see many new students come to UWC ISAK Japan and fall in love with the country just as much as I have.



From Japan

Rosalie Jacobs - UWC ISAK 2022-2024

Coming to UWC ISAK Japan was such a new and exciting experience for both of us. We were introduced to the school and the community, and the amazing area close to the campus. Because of the recent pandemic; we were the first grade who got to meet each other in person, something we all celebrated. The earlier grades had the unfortunate problem of having to go through quarantine or online school, because of the Japanese COVID-restrictions, and therefore we felt incredibly lucky to escape that and get a "normal" introduction to the school.

Arriving at UWC, there are always so many new and fresh interpretations about what is going to be your life for the next two years, but after a while you start becoming used to it. I noticed how I got used to the schedule, routines and I started to recognise names of places and people better. It was all new, and as I had no (and still have no) chance at speaking or reading Japanese, it was very exotic.

The best part for me about coming to UWC ISAK is however still exploring the Japanese culture and language. In fall break I had the chance to go off-campus, and I went on a trip to Tokyo with my new friends. This is one of the highlights of my stay at UWC ISAK so far and it is something I'm grateful I got the chance to experience. UWC is all about challenging yourself and trying new things, and my trip to Tokyo was completely different to anything I was used to. Japanese culture is very different to Norwegian culture or any European culture in general, and going to a grand city like Tokyo can be very overwhelming. There were a lot of people and noise that I wasn't used to, and a completely new metro system that I had to learn and understand. But as the only thing one can do, I adapted and I enjoyed all of the exploring of the amazing city. We had to organise everything ourselves, and communicating with locals without barely speaking a word of Japanese was tough, but in the end we learnt a lot and had the best time. UWC ISAK really gives students opportunities to take initiative and be independent, and I think this has been very valuable to the school through the hard last years. I appreciate what the school does by giving students opportunities like the one I had over the break this fall, and I am so grateful for it.



From eSwatini

Kristine Lyckander - UWC Waterford Kamhlaba 2020-2022

Attending a UWC was a completely different experience from the one I was imagining when I applied in January 2020. There were suddenly the obstacles of online school due to Covid-19, which delayed my departure to Waterford Kamhlaba in eSwatini for about two months. However, online school was also continuously enforced throughout my first year due to something my Norwegian co-year and myself had not foreseen - the outbursts of civil unrest. Whilst our UWC school was safely sitting on top of a beautiful hill in a country of breathtaking landscape and beauty, young students from other schools in the country were protesting and striking against the unfair ruling of the King. They were calling for democracy to end the huge disproportion of wealth distribution in the country, as it was mainly caused by the nature of the absolute monarchy that has persisted for years. Brave students were facing military powers fighting for justice, whilst our UWC school, due to historical ties with the royal family, chose to stay silent - which was one of the things that made me question whether the UWC mission statement really held true for Waterford.

In addition to this, I faced several uncomfortable realities as I finally understood how deeply rooted my privilege as being white is. Having political stability and peace is only one of multiple things I have come to take for granted as I have grown up in Norway. I could come home during term breaks and become employed within my first week, which gave me the economic possibilities to travel in Southern Africa with the lifelong friends I gained. I could go on and on about the incredulous opportunities I have solely due to my background. However, what made me the most uncomfortable was my initial obliviousness to Western ignorance and stereotypes against the African continent. It was only when I moved across the world that I understood that one should not refer to African countries like "Africa" - the same way we rarely refer to European or Asian countries as "Europe" or "Asia". The image of Africa as a country is highly destructive as it only conveys a single story of a huge continent and strips cultural differences between an abundance of countries. I believe all Western people have a responsibility to be conscious and more aware of the aftermath of colonialism, even though our daily lives might not be drastically affected by what happens in the Global South.

I was reflecting on my past two years at Waterford just before I graduated in November 2022. I came to the conclusion that my UWC experience was nothing like I expected - yet it completely fulfilled everything I hoped it to be. I wrote in my application that I desired to leave my comfort zone, get a richer cultural understanding and widen my perspectives. That is exactly what I have achieved throughout the past two years. I have become a more open-minded and understanding person than I once was, and I will always be incredibly grateful for everything I learnt there that dismantled my Eurocentric education and perspectives. Waterford will always be a second home to me.



From Canada

In August 2022 I moved to Canada to start my journey at Pearson College UWC. This was something that I had looked forward to for years - a dream come true. Moving across the world starting at Pearson College has been an adventure of ups and downs. It has been full of both difficult challenges, amazing moments, as well as just okay times. Just as life is wherever you are, I suppose.

One thing that sets Pearson apart from other schools is the beautiful nature and the focus on indigenous culture. We take time to acknowledge that we live, learn and work on the unceded territory of the Sc'ianew First Nation. You can often see seals swimming around in Pedder Bay, or go on a field trip to the magical Race Rocks Ecological Reserve and say hi to all the sea lions!

Being in an environment like Pearson, stepping out of my comfort zone and not being fully surrounded by my safety net back home - I've had to make important decisions for myself in a different way than before. This can be very challenging when you are standing in the middle of it, but looking back at it, I've realized that I've grown immensely on this.

In my first term at Pearson, I've discovered new exciting interests that I didn't have back home. An example of this is that I didn't end up liking one of the subjects I chose for my first term. I unexpectedly ended up switching to theater, which has ended up being one of the subjects at Pearson I enjoy the most! I must also applaud the teachers at Pearson, as most of them are so engaged and talented in the work they are doing. It really makes a positive difference in the learning environment.

Connecting with the people at Pearson is mostly quite easy as everyone is in the same position and wants to make friends and get to know each other. I have made some friendships already with people from so diverse and different places that mean the world to me. Prioritizing time for yourself can be difficult at Pearson, and things can easily get overwhelming with a busy schedule. I think this is something that one personally has to figure out during their stay, and for example use the forest trails for what they are worth!

I am truly thankful for this first term: all it has taught me and all the amazing people I have met. I am looking forward to starting term 2 and continuing on my UWC-adventure.

Norwegian UWC'ers around the world

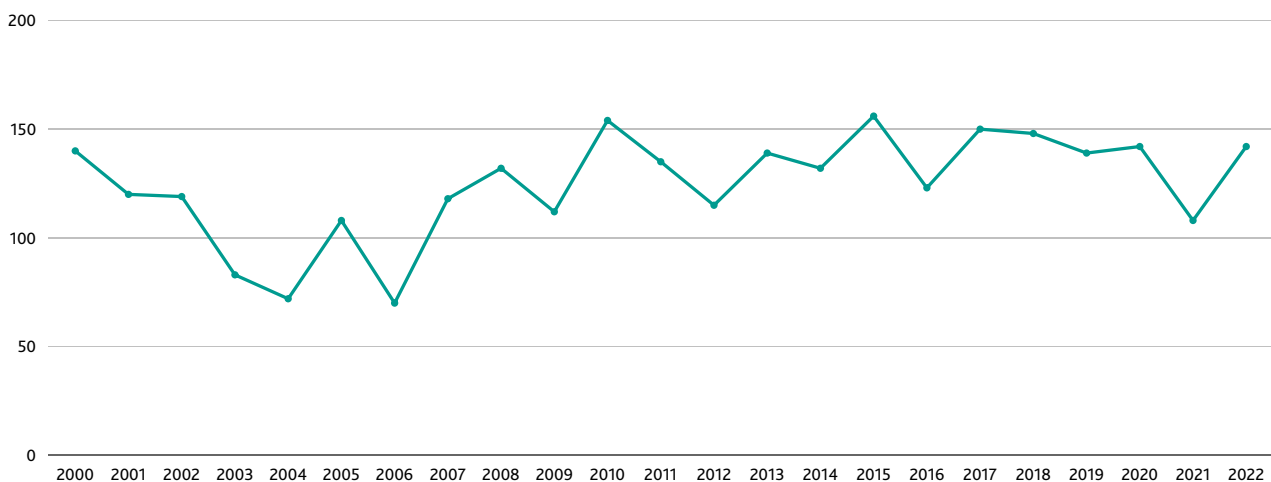
UWC Norway selects 40 students each year, all supported by scholarships from the Norwegian government. In 2022, the students attended 14 of the 18 UWC schools.

The Norwegian Directorate for Higher Education and Skills (HK-dir) is UWC Norway's government partner and partly sponsors the scholarships to the Norwegian students. HK-dir also organizes the selection of Norwegian students in collaboration with a nomination committee.

We received a total of 142 applications in 2022. This is the same number of applications we received in 2020 before the start of the pandemic. This was a positive development after seeing a decrease in 2021.

Once the deadline on January 25 passed, the nomination committee assessed all the applications and invited 75 applicants for interviews during the second week of March. This was the second year that we had video interviews, due to covid restrictions. After the 2022 selection process ended, 40 students accepted their offers and were admitted at 14 of the 18 UWC schools.

The number of Norwegian applicants to UWC had been stable over the last few years, but we saw a decrease in 2021 presumably due to the ongoing covid-19 pandemic.



Supporting the Norwegian UWC students

UWC Norway has two elected Student Contacts that are part of the student nomination committee. The student contacts in 2022 were Sergio Prin-Sand and Ann Charlott Wardle

These two alumni are there to help out with issues or concerns that students or parents have during the two years at UWC. They have been students at UWC and are familiar with the ups and downs of campus life.

The Nordic and Baltic National Committees conduct a joint survey among our students every year, and jointly follow up any issues with the school(s) in question.

Introducing our new students to UWC

The introduction weekend was held at Fossheim leirsted the first weekend of July. Our 40 new students were introduced to the UWC movement through several workshops and informal activities.

The workshops were run by National Committee volunteers, second years and external experts on various topics like the UWC mission statement, mental health, sustainable development and the IB programme. The incoming students were treated to a wonderful vegetarian menu, and enjoyed playing football, volleyball and swimming in the breaks.



UWC Day

The UWC Day was celebrated in Bergen, Tromsø and Oslo. This year's slogan was "Peace begins with us".

In Bergen, a group gathered for discussions and a quiz, and mini golf was on the programme in Tromsø.

In Oslo, UWCers gathered at a cosy pub to learn about 'new technology in waste management', 'peace and literature' and 'peace and personal economy' from expert alumni. The presentations were followed by intriguing questions, amicable debates and good conversations. In other words: An evening with proper UWC spirit!



"Back to the city" August 31

To welcome old and new UWCers (back) to the city we arranged several informal and relaxed gatherings, a hike to Ullevålseter and mingling at pubs. These events seemed very welcome, and people seemed energised to meet familiar or new faces after the summer holidays. We definitely hope to repeat this year's programme next autumn.

Christmas Party in January

For the 2022 Christmas party, the network committee in the National Committee decided to take a new spin on the tradition. Arranged after New Year's Eve this time, the annual Christmas party is a celebration for current students, alumni and friends.



Spreading the word about UWC

The communication and marketing team plays a vital role in making sure that the Norwegian National Committee and the 18 UWC schools are visible in Norway. With UWC Norway's vision in mind, the team has been working on a range of communication platforms, and put a lot of effort into recruiting new students for 2023.

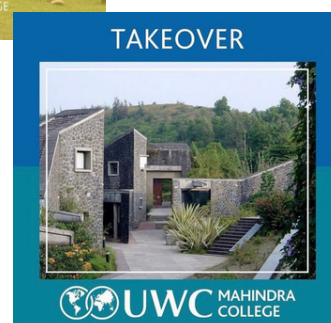
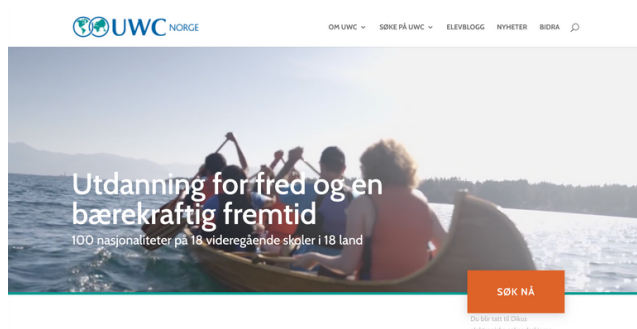
In 2022, physical events have again been made possible – at least during the second half. However, we have also continued our presence and engagement online and on social media, as we want to reach youth across all of Norway.

UWC Norway has maintained an active presence on Facebook, Instagram, Twitter and TikTok. Facebook has been used mainly to spread the word about UWC to parents and other who might know youth who can be interested in applying to UWC. In addition, Facebook is being used to communicate with current student and potential applicants through Facebook groups.

We are also getting closer to reach 3000 followers in our Instagram account, @uwcnoray – check it out and give us a follow! During 2022 we have had several takeovers from all our campuses, that are getting attention and creating engagement. These takeovers give a unique perspective into what UWC really is like today. The audience here is mostly alumni, current students, parents, and potential applicants. Instagram is a social media platform we believe is efficient in reaching youth all over Norway, and we will continue to be even more proactive here going into 2023!

We have also had takeover on our TikTok-account. The fast-paced style of videos on Tik-Tok and Instagram are truly well-fitted to portray for example the diversity of the student body at a UWC - cutting from a student from one country to the next, all doing the same geography homework and eating in the same cafeteria.

In November, we hosted our annual information meeting for potential applicants in Oslo, which was also streamed online via Zoom and posted to our Facebook-page afterwards. Both alumni, and UWC-parents gave input and information about their UWC experience, and we informed about the new application criteria that are valid from 2022. Attendance was good, over 60 people joined either in person or online, and we received several questions during our Q and A session.



Inclusion of parents

In the National Committee, parents of UWC students are represented by two parents of current students. During the year, they organize "parental meetings" and are regularly in touch with other parents.

In May 2022, UWC Norway arranged two parental meetings. New parents were invited to get information and guidance from experienced UWC parents. UWC Norway's parental contacts presented the UWC school system and current parents, and former pupils shared experiences and tips. New parents asked about vaccines, travel tips, room facilities food, and exams.

The second meeting was arranged for parents whose children were starting their second year at UWC. The parents talked about their children's studies, deadlines, exams, summer plans, and choices for the future. Some UWC students deliver papers and prepare for tests during summer holidays, so the parents discussed their children's expectations and tips to support them, and at the same time make sure that they get enough rest to be prepared for their final year.

The parental meetings were well received by parents who had many questions about travel insurance, health care, infection control, vaccines and quarantine practice at the different schools. The student contacts, our Director of Administration, the deputy chair of UWC Norway and a former UWC teacher joined in on the conversations, which were held digitally to make it possible for everyone to participate.

There is an active Facebook group for Norwegian UWC parents (UWC-foreldre) to connect parents, parental contacts and the rest of the board to make it easy to bring up discussions and share advice across the Norwegian UWC family.
